Curriculum and Pedagogy:

EDCP 349 Curriculum & Instruction in Science: Elementary (2 credits)

The main purpose of the course is to develop a working knowledge or curriculum organization in elementary science, to develop confidence and skill in the creation and organization of specific science themes. We will work within a guided inquiry framework as we experience, interpret, and learn through a trans-disciplinary lens. Emphasis will be placed on curricula that interweave social and ecological justice; specifically experiences that inspire learners to develop environmental care and connection. (2 cr.)
