Course Description

The course is intended to provide teacher candidates a context in which to examine and discuss the many facets of curriculum development and its implementation in/for the First Nations communities. *For students in the Native Indian Teacher Education Program (NITEP) only.*

The successful applicant should be knowledgeable about the inclusion of Aboriginal history, content and worldviews in the K-12 curriculum and/or have experience working in Aboriginal education. Persons of Aboriginal ancestry and/or who possess knowledge of the local community and language/culture (Heiltsuk) are preferred.

The course is taught in a small group format. Applicants must have a minimum of a bachelor's degree with at least 2 years teaching experience. A master's degree is preferred. Course instructor duties may include: teaching, holding regular office hours, marking assignments and exams, reporting grades and attending orientation meetings as well as follow-up sessions where applicable. Duties may also involve some or all of the following: preparation and involvement in seminars, lectures, discussion periods and tutorials; invigilation duties; and academic counseling of students during office hours.
